

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF OAKVILLE

BY-LAW NUMBER 1984-42

A by-law to designate certain property
as property of historic and architectural
value and interest (Granary).

THE COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The property commonly known and referred to as the Granary is hereby designated as a property of historic and architectural value and interest pursuant to The Ontario Heritage Act, for the reason as set out in Schedule "A" to this by-law.
2. The property designated by this by-law is the property described in Schedule "B" to this by-law.
3. This designation includes both the interior and exterior of the Granary structure located on the property described in Schedule "B" hereto.

SCHEDULE "A"

Reasons for Designation:

The Granary is considered to be one of those rare survivals of the simple functional building of the nineteenth century. It is a well proportioned structure of warm brown local stone and light grey Kingston Limestone brought to Oakville as ballast. It is referred to in Hazel C. Mathew's book Oakville and the Sixteen as having been built by William Francis Romain and Peter A. MacDougald. The designation is to protect both the internal and external portions of the structure.

SCHEDULE "B"

FIRSTLY

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land situate, lying and being in the Town of Oakville, in the Regional Municipality of Halton, and being composed of that part of Parcel 2-2, Section D-6 in the Land Titles Office of Halton (No. 20) designated as Part 1 on 20R-5742.

SECONDLY

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land situate, lying and being in the Town of Oakville, in the Regional Municipality of Halton, and being composed of that part of Robinson Street according to Registered Plan No. 1, designated as Part 2 on 20R-5742.
